#### Message from the President

It has been a soggy fall at WWK and there is now over two feet of water going over the dam. This increase is largely due to heavy rains.

As many of you know, the dam was named "The Andy Vurma Memorial Dam" earlier this year in honour of the significant contribution made to the reconstruction of the dam and many other projects on WWK by Andy Vurma. A plaque commemorating the naming has been attached to the rock near Bennett's Bay Government Dock. A dedication ceremony was held after the Annual General Meeting on July 31, 2010 followed by a lunch. Mayor Chris Armstrong and I spoke about Andy Vurma. Four directors (Lynn Abbott-Lennox, John Bray, Pat Ferris and Rod Bennett) chose to stand down from their directors' positions after many years of dedicated service. I am pleased that four members have stepped forward and were elected as directors at the AGM. I would like to welcome Patricia Forbes, Carey Frew, Jacquelyn Morgan, and Mike Maceina as new directors. Pat Forbes has agreed to be VP and work with Jacquelyn



Morgan on the Archives. Carey Frew has agreed to be secretary and Mike Maceina has agreed to take over the water quality testing work previously done by Pat Ferris.

One of the major issues arising at the AGM was the parking around Bennett's and Indian Narrows. Dalton Ferris kindly volunteered to head a committee looking into this situation. Please see his report in this Newsletter.

Your Executive is still working on a site for a helipad near Bennett's. We will need to get special permission for this but hope to have more information in time for the spring.

After many hours of work, I am

pleased to advise that the permanent water monitoring system is back up and running properly. Our thanks to George Comrie who spent hours testing, removing the damaged sensors, investigating better quality replacements and then reinstalling the whole unit and callibrating it accurately.

Finally I would like to thank the directors for complying with the tight time frame of this newsletter and a special thanks to Lesley Hugill for pulling it all together. Thanks all!

# Municipal Election Edition

We are sending this edition of the newsletter out early in order to provide our members with information concerning the candidates running in the Municipal election.

Please see the information later in the newsletter and remember to VOTE!

#### Whitestone Municipal Elections - 2010

Held every four years, municipal elections throughout Ontario will take place on Monday, October 25th.

Residents and property owners in the Municipality of Whitestone can vote for one candidate for

Mayor and up to four candidates for Councillor, as well as one public school Trustee.

You should have received information by mail from the candidates running for Whitestone Council. Ballots have now been mailed to everyone on the Municipality's voters' list. To verify that you are on the voters list and/or request that you be added, call the Whitestone Municipal Office at 705-389-2466.

George Comrie and I attended the all-candidates meeting on Saturday, October 2nd at the Dunchurch Community Centre, along with over 100 other Whitestone ratepayers. Each candidate was given three minutes to present his or her platform, after which there was an opportunity for electors to ask questions of the candidates.

- Morley Moore (Dunchurch) Councillor 2006-2010

# FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL TRUSTEE - Near North District School Board (4 candidates):

• Colleen Goupil - Trustee and Vice Chair 2006-2010

### On behalf of the Association, I raised the following questions:

- 1) Are you in favour of lake-front multi-unit development such as time share/fractional ownership, or condominiums? All candidates declined to answer this question directly, but instead noted that such concerns should be addressed in the Municipality's Official Plan, scheduled to be reviewed starting in 2011 with extensive public input.
- **2)** Would you support the sale of crown lands in the municipality to increase tax revenue?

Most candidates said "NO". A few noted that the Municipality does not have the authority to sell crown lands, although it could lobby the provincial government to do so.

**3)** What can the Association do to improve the dump sites? Councillor candidates Carter and Church emphasized recycling

and composting. Mayoral candidate Ferry also emphasized the need to "go green" and to educate the public on green practices. Mayoral candidate Ladd proposed mandatory recycling, enforced at the dumpsite.

#### Other questions dealt with:

- The appropriateness of walking trials that are being established under a provincial grant;
- The possibility of webcasting Council meetings so that ratepayers would know which Councillors are proposing and supporting which initiatives;
- · By-law enforcement.

# Here is a brief summary of other pertinent comments made by each of the candidates.

#### **Barry Bell**

Council candidate Barry Bell spoke at length about the previous all-candidates meeting four years ago and the perceptions raised from it. He apologized if he had upset anyone by his comments, but said he would not apologize for telling the truth. He reaffirmed that he does not support the current system of mail-in ballots, preferring instead that voters be physically present to vote. He stated he would like to broaden the Municipality's tax base. He admitted it would be "a leap of faith" to vote for him, but concluded by asking attendees to "give him a chance".

#### **Don Carter**

Council candidate Carter feels there is room for improvement on Council. He is in favour of improving roads and landfill sites. He would be proactive. Mr. Carter also mentioned the many committees he has served on, including the Dunchurch nursing station. He was Reeve of Hagerman Twp. prior to incorporation of Whitestone, and would like to return to Council to achieve what is best for the community. Regarding walking trails in the Municipality, Mr. Carter stated "We can't



abuse the rights of other users of the lands in question". He also recommended cooperating with other neighbouring municipalities.

#### **Bill Church**

Council candidate Bill Church oversaw a septic system control program in Hagerman and believes it should be reinstituted in Whitestone to protect the environment. He is also concerned with achieving shorter wait times at the West Parry Sound Health Centre emergency room. The revisions coming up in 2011 to our Official Plan are very important. As far as approving condos, timeshares, etc. he said our lakes must be protected. He concluded by thanking the attendees for ten years in office, and said he is always available to them.

#### **Colette Deacon**

Council candidate Colette Deacon said she wants a "new and improved Council", with better communication. She has lived in the area for five years, and believes the Municipality should be run like a cost-conscious business. She is in favour of partnerships with other municipalities and establishing programs for seniors and youth. She also believes it is time the Municipality had a full-time paid Fire Chief. She concluded by saying she is "applying for the job" of Councillor.

#### Joe Lamb

Council candidate Joe Lamb began by stating the current Council has done well financially – tax dollars have been well spent and reserves are higher than four years ago. He warned against returning to the old practices. He noted the Official Plan revisions due in 2011, and suggested that we need to learn how to plan better. He said that in the past four years he has tried to represent all residents of the Municipality.

#### **Morley Moore**

Council candidate Morley Moore has seen improvements over the past four years. He anticipates more savings in future because some winter contracts may be cancelled because of recent municipal equipment purchases. He would like to see more money put into road maintenance and to alleviate the lack of space at the Fire Hall. Mr. Moore concluded by saying he has enjoyed the last four years and there is still lots to be accomplished.

#### **Tom Sutcliffe**

Council candidate Tom Sutcliffe stressed the importance of the Whitestone Official Plan and its review next year. He also stated that Council needs the input of residents and that residents should "use their Councillors" to express their choices and concerns. Mr. Sutcliffe was on Hagerman Council for twelve years and continues to serve on the Parry Sound Area Planning

Board. He urged ratepayers to contribute their expertise to the Municipality. He concluded by thanking all who attended and saying he "hopes to work for us".

#### **Chris Armstrong**

Mayoral candidate Chris Armstrong reflected on the accomplishments of Council over the past four years, including cell phone service for the area, road improvements to Hwy 520 and the WahWashKesh Road, and the replacement of Farley's bridge. He is committed to establishing a permanent home for the Dunchurch Post Office and to improving fire and health services. He also stressed the importance of the Official Plan review in 2011 and asked for input. He stated that in the eight years he has been on Council taxes have been reduced by 33%. Mr. Armstrong concluded by saying that it has been a privilege for him to serve, and that he has developed good rapport with politicians at all levels of government.

#### **Caroline Ferry**

Mayoral candidate Caroline Ferry believes better communication of the needs of the community and the workings of Council is key. She also believes the Official Plan is the key to preventing our area from becoming a "mini Muskoka". She said there should be a means for ratepayers to evaluate Council. She concluded by thanking the audience for their tough questions, and by advising that interviews with the three Mayoral candidates will be broadcast on Moose FM 103.3 on October 6th, 7th, and 8th as part of the news at 6:00, 7:00, and 8:00 am.

#### Alan Ladd

Mayoral candidate Alan Ladd highlighted his record as a Whitestone Councillor. He said he would not make promises he couldn't keep. He emphasized his "different approach to that of previous mayors" and explained that he would be more collaborative and would seek to build consensus building. He stressed that the environment should come first, and proposed mandatory recycling. He also advocated initiating a "report card" for Council, and documenting Council debate and votes more thoroughly. Mr. Ladd concluded by saying that complete transparency in Council should be mandatory.

#### **Parking**

At the past annual meeting it was decided to create an ad hoc committee to see if parking availability could be improved at Bennett's Bay and Indian narrows. This committee has been formed. Its membership includes Ed Bennett Sr., John Nelson and myself Dalton Ferris.

So far we have had some communication and have done a walk around to see what options for more space may be available. We have a few ideas. We are also aware that most of the time there is not a parking issue. The parking issue though is clear on most holiday weekends and for a few other weekends in the summer.

The east side of the road to Indian Narrows now is posted "no parking". The signs seemed to be mostly ignored this past summer. For this no parking to be effective, more signs need to be installed, as people often come in after dark and the current signs are easy to miss. This no parking limitation has made the parking issue more serious but at the same time deals with a safety issue that results when both sides of the road are used for parking.

The drainage needs to be repaired on the grade leading down to the Bennett's Bay dock-The shoulder is gouged out bad enough that that only large trucks can park in some spots.

Thanks to the generosity of the "Wigston Family" quite a number of vehicles park in their private lot, seemingly either with or without their approval,— this has helped relieve some congestion.

We are currently looking for an area that could be improved/graded for new parking spaces and also are considering adding fill to the west side of the Indian Narrows Road for increased parking spaces-perhaps angle parking. These options are merely ideas at this time as they both involve working with either the MNR and or the Municipality.

#### Three In Whitestone Mayor Race

WHITESTONE – Mayor Chris Armstrong will face a member of his own council in the upcoming municipal election.

Armstrong, who is completing his first term as mayor, faces councillor Alan Ladd and relative newcomer to the Whitestone political scene Caroline Ferry.

"In the past four years our municipality has received more grant projects than ever. We have done massive projects," said Armstrong. These projects include work on the Bunny Trail, renovations to the community centre and replacement of Farley's Road bridge.

"I was fortunate enough to lobby to have over \$3 million of improvements to Highway 520 done, which was no municipal dollars, it was under provincial," he said.

He said he began his term on council by lobbying to have cellular telephone service upgraded in the area. "It's projects like that that are what I like to do, when there's an issue, working with other levels of government and surrounding municipalities," he said. "I've always had concerns regarding our municipal tax rate and as these improvements go on we've been able to systematically reduce the tax rate and I want to see that continue."

Armstrong says he hopes to gain more support from surrounding municipalities

to combat the recent Emergency Medical Services levy increases.

Armstrong is looking forward to working with associations to make changes needed to the official plan and said he and his council work well as a team. "Do we always agree on a decision? No. But that's why it's a council and we've been able to put improvements into our municipality," he said.

Ladd, who is one of the councillors that Armstrong has worked with over the past four years, is running against him in the election. "As far as Chris and I are concerned. I think we're friends and I don't think there's any bad feeling between us," he said.

Ladd had originally put his name in to run as a councillor. He says he was approached by a number of people wanting to know why he wasn't running for mayor this term. That, combined with the prompting of family and friends, initiated the pursuit for the mayor's chair.

"The Municipality of Whitestone and the people here are pretty important to me," he said. "I really think it's time." This is not his first time running for the top position. He ran for reeve in the 2003 election and lost to fellow councillor Bill Church by 35 votes.

Ladd feels his background in labour

mediation, his work as a senior advisor to the Minister of Labour in Ottawa, and his work as an electrician give him a good balance. "I think it's important to understand what people's requirements are," he said.

He says open communication with the residents of Whitestone is essential. "I want to make sure our ratepayers are well informed of what's going on," he said. "I believe in transparency and I want to be sure people see us that way. I want people to feel comfortable."

Ladd doesn't feel that, in the next term on council, they will be able to rely on the funding injections that they have received over the past term.

"I believe that in the last four years that we've had a lot of great opportunities through provincial and federal funding," he said. "You have to think about what your most important projects are or what you have to do." Ladd says they have begun upgrading roads in the municipality and he does not want that to discontinue because of lack of provincial and federal funding. "We have to deal with our own financial matters in the next term and I think we can do that," he said.

The newcomer to the political arena is Caroline Ferry.





"I realized my skill set was more for facilitation so I decided that that was more where my skill set needed to be applied," she said about her decision to run for mayor instead of councillor.

Ferry works for as a respite network coordinator for Community Living Parry Sound. She says that she is running on the platform of communication and giving people a choice and a voice. "Right now they don't have that with the current council," she said. "Right now the communication is that they get a newsletter. They're not allowed to speak at council meetings until after decisions are made. So they can go and they can sit through a whole council meeting but they're not allowed to talk until there is a question-and-answer period at the very end of the meeting."

She says people have a tough time getting delegations with council. "Just speaking with residents, they have had those issues," she said. "One of them was when they wanted to do a full-time

fire chief, basically it came back saying that, no, why would we pay somebody when they're already doing it for free." She says a full-time fire chief is very important to the community.


Ferry says she would also like to see more efficient use of municipal resources. "I think there's some things that can be tightened up and tidied up and jobs within the municipality that could probably be tightened up," she said. She said she would have to evaluate the positions and what is being done "and see where we can go in the future to tighten it up."

She says she has looked at the budget and feels there are areas that could be worked on. "They bought a brand new excavator and it needed work so there was a \$600 shipping fee to ship it to North Bay to have it serviced but the service part is under warranty," she said. "It's things like that that should have been looked into before the purchase.

### Graan Cornar by N. Glenn Perrett

Products can be "green" for a variety of reasons. Some are made from natural, non-toxic ingredients, others last for a very long time and can be recycled while others are made from sustainable material.

The following are some eco-items I've been impressed with.

#### Nature Clean Dishwashing Liquid

(Nature Clean www.naturecleanliving.com)

Living next to the lake means we have to use cleaners that cause the least impact to the environment. For years we have used Nature Clean products from Frank T. Ross & Sons Ltd. This company has been making effective, environmentally-friendly cleaners since the 1960s. For cleaning our dishes at home and at the cottage we use their dishwashing liquid which does not contain phosphates and other harmful chemicals. It is also readily biodegradable and it is cruelty free. By using their eco refill you can significantly reduce plastics. Even the box the eco refill comes in is unbleached and "made from 94% post consumer content."

#### Sisal Rug

(Home Depot www.homedepot.ca)

In her book Easy Green Living, Renée Loux points out a dark side pertaining to many carpets and rugs.

"In your home, conventional synthetic carpets and rugs and the adhesives and backing materials used to affix them all emit VOCs, often throughout their lifetime."

To offer some protection to our wood floors, which have been finished with hemp oil, we use an area rug made of sisal. The attractive, natural fibre, durable rug from Home Depot is made by fibres harvested from the leaves of the cactus plant in Africa. The rug is easy to maintain and looks great on a heavy traffic area in our cottage. We've been delighted with our sisal rug.

#### Firewood Storage Rack

(Lee Valley www.leevalley.com)

Efficient wood stoves are a relatively green way to heat our homes and cottages. We get our wood from trees that have recently died and which are not providing homes for animals. I don't like having large woodpiles, which can attract animals, near our cottage or home. But I do like having a supply of


firewood close by. My answer to this dilemma is the Firewood Storage Rack from Lee Valley.

The simple rack consists of two tubular steel ends attached to 2 x 4s. Each support is 41" high and 12.5" wide. You supply the 2 x 4s and the screws to attach the steel ends to the wood. We used 8' 2 x 4s which will provide us with nearly a face cord. By removing the 2 x 4s we can easily transport this rack back and forth to the cottage.

### Sangean PR-D8 AM/FM Radio-MP3 Player/Recorder

(www.ccrane.com)

We enjoy music at the cottage and this item is more than an AM/FM portable radio. It is also an MP3 player and recorder which can record from turntables, cassette decks or other sources through its line-input jack (a secure digital memory card is needed for recording and this is not included.) The recording quality can be adjusted from the standard quality 64 kbps to 128 kbps or 192 kbps. Microphones on the radio can be used to record meetings or your voice. Other features include an alarm clock, adjustable sleep timer, head phone jacks and more.



### Book Reviews by N. Glenn Perrett

#### **Beautiful Joe**

Margaret Marshall Saunders Puffin Canada 2009, 253 pages ISBN: 9780670064649

Winter is a good time to read a compelling dog story and 117 years after it was first published, Beautiful Joe is just as entertaining and, unfortunately, relevant.

Beautiful Joe is a story of extreme cruelty and brutality. It is also one of kindness, compassion and loyalty. Beautiful Joe was a dog of mixed breeding who was savagely attacked by his "master" who treated all of his animals terribly. This man cut off the ears and the tail of the terrier mix dog. Fortunately, the mutilated animal was rescued and taken to live with a kind family.

Told from the viewpoint of Beautiful Joe, the entertaining novel looks at the Morris family, including many animals they saved from harm, life in Maine and issues affecting animals. While the correlation of cruelty against animals and violence against people has gained significant attention in recent decades, Margaret Marshall Saunders was aware of this phenomenon almost 120 years ago.

While Beautiful Joe is a novel, it is based on true events. While Saunders set the story in Maine, the actual story took place in Meaford, Ontario. This classic story was the first Canadian book to sell over a million copies.

#### Lakeland: Journeys into the Soul of Canada

Allan Casey Greystone Books 2009, 255 pages ISBN: 9781553653080

Those who have enjoyed a cottage, camping or simply visiting a lake will enjoy traveling with author Allan Casey as he travels across Canada visiting lakes in various provinces and during the different seasons. Besides reading about the author's trips to these special places and how important lakes are in providing us

book, "Humble cabins with families of eight sleeping in bunk beds have been replaced by sprawling retirement homes with two occupants and three bathrooms...The transition from seasonal use to permanent colonization is another force of change in the proximate wilderness."

We are lucky to live in a land of lakes. We need to learn more about these special, fragile places and to respect them more. Reading Lakeland: Journeys into the Soul of Canada can help in this vital endeavour.

#### Seasons: Change in the Natural World

Play Bac Publishing USA, Inc. 2009, 60 pages ISBN: 9781602140837 ages 2+

We are fortunate in this part of the world to see such dramatic changes as the seasons unfold. Seasons: Changes in the Natural World is a children's book that illustrates, in words and photographs, some of the natural wonders that occur during the seasons. Children of all ages will enjoy seeing flowers blooming and tadpoles becoming frogs in spring, dragonflies and salamanders in summer, autumn leaves and migrating birds in fall and frozen lakes and animal tracks in the snow in winter.

#### The Field Guide to Natural Phenomena

If you enjoy field guides you may want to add The Field Guide to Natural Phenomena to your collection. The subtitle to the book is Secret The World of Optical, Atmospheric and Celestial Wonders and it does look at these things

with chapters on Celestial Phenomena, Optical Phenomena, Atmospheric Phenomena, Electrical Phenomena, Geological Phenomena and Aquatic Phenomena. Each chapter contains considerable information about the natural wonders accompanied by interesting photographs and informative diagrams. "Identification Guides" are included in the chapters as well.

For example, Chapter Two: Optical Phenomena contains information on light from the sun, clear-air phenomena,

water-droplet phenomena, rainbows, icecrystal phenomena and the aurora borealis. Field guides in this chapter are on superior mirage, rainbows, light pillars

> and aurora. These short field guides describe the item, what occurs, where to see them and when to see them.

the title suggests, this collection contains Hank Ketcham's Dennis the Menace cartoons for the years 1961-1962. I was too young to read them when they first were published, but I'm enjoying them now. Besides the humourous cartoons, Ketcham's artwork is excellent.


Dennis the Menace first appeared in newspapers in 1951 and Ketcham con-

> tinued his comic strip until 1994 when his assistant took over the cartoon. Hank Ketcham died in 2001.



#### **Water Monitoring Station**

Those of you who check the lake level on our website from time to time will know that the Hobo U30 monitoring station has been back up and running since the end of August, after being out of service most of the summer. The outage was caused by a severe lightning storm on May 27th that damaged the monitoring unit, as well as, the in-water pressure and temperature sensors. The good news is that we didn't lose three months worth of lake level data because our original stand-alone U20 logger is still in service as a backup, and it is not affected by electrical disturbances. The other good news is that the manufacturer repaired or replaced the damaged equipment under warranty.

Because we have had problems in the past with the in-water sensors, we decided to upgrade them to a more accurate - and hopefully more reliable - combined pressure and temperature transducer at a cost of approximately \$1,000. This expenditure was supported by members at the July 31st Annual General Meeting.

After installing the new equipment, we "calibrated" it to report the actual depth of water in feet flowing over the dam above Canal Rapids. (The sensor measures changes in water pressure as the lake level rises and falls, but it is located in approximately four feet of water when the lake is level with the sill of the dam; so we have to apply a conversion factor to it to get the level reported on the website.) I am researching the possibility of determining the elevation (above sea level) of the surface of the lake from the reported level over the dam, and will report on this in a future newsletter. Keep in mind, though, that there is a small loss of head as the water flows down the river towards the dam; so the lake level in the main parts of the lake could be several inches higher than what you see at the dam during times of peak flow.

If you check the data from the monitoring station regularly, you may occasionally see it report a sensor error, which results in a discontinuity in the data from that particular sensor, and causes the corresponding graphs to be unavailable for a few days. This is most often caused by static electricity in the vicinity of the monitoring station. We have installed a small uninterruptible power supply to protect the monitoring equipment from power line disturbances, but static discharges can still disrupt the air temperature sensor and rain gauge, which are mounted on a mast above Bennett's store.

Your Association continues to believe that having reliable lake level (and other water-related) data for Wahwashkesh on a continuous basis is necessary in order to understand and manage water levels and flows in the Magnetawan watershed. In the coming year, we hope to review with the Ministry of Natural Resources the data accumulated since we started logging, with a view to better controlling rises in the lake level during the summer months.

# Message From New Director - Mike Maceina

My wife (Oyie) and I just finished spending our first summer here on Wahwashkesh Lake. When we were looking for a cottage in summer 2009, we searched in the Parry Sound area. I am a retired professor from Auburn University; Alabama (USA) where I taught classes in fishery and aquatic sciences. I also conducted various fish-related research, but my specialty was freshwater fishery assessment and have examined water quality and nutrient effects on fish. My life-long love of water activities led to seeking a summer place on the water where it is not as beastly hot as in the southeastern USA. Oyie is from the Guelph area and has lots of family around Toronto, so coming here made a lot of sense. Oyie and I both like to fish, but granted, I like to fish more.

I have assumed the duties of water quality coordinator for Wahwashkesh Lake. If you have been or plan to be a volunteer water quality sampler as part of the Ontario Ministry of the Environment (OME) Lake Partners Program, please contact me (3 Macey Drive, RR2, Dunchurch, POA 1GO or email at maceimi@auburn.edu). We are looking for 3 to 4 more water quality sampling volunteers. Not a whole lot of work is required and maintaining our good water quality in Wahwashkesh Lake is a goal we all share. In May, the water sample you collect is sent back to OME lab in Dorset using a pre-paid envelope. You will also be asked to take measurements of water clarity about 6 times during the summer months (May-September) and then you send this information to the Lake Partners Program at the end of the year. Some concerned has been raised about the potential release of treated sewage upstream in the Magnetawan River and the possibly impact on water quality in Wahwashkesh Lake. During the up coming winter, the Board of Directors will discuss this issue, attempt to determine the magnitude of these discharges, and the effects this may have on the nutrients and water quality in our lake. Feel free to contact me if you have any questions or concerns about water quality or aquatic resources in Wahwashkesh Lake, I will do my best to answer these.

# Membership Renewals and Dock Permits


