#### Deja Vu All Over Again

You may enjoy reading the following Newsletter excerpts:

"It was recommended that floats be placed... where rocks are a hazard";

"Members requested that notices be placed at the government dock . . . that no cars be allowed to park there";

"A development company is selling lots with 100 feet lake frontage at Otter Lake and this could happen at (our) lake";

"The (water) level does vary anywhere from 6' to 15', partly due to the control dam at Ahmic Harbour".

These read as if they could have come from recent newsletters, but they are, in fact, quotes from a newly discovered newsletter dated June 20, 1960. Some things have not changed a great deal in over half a century!

While preparing Doug Elliott's house for sale after he moved to a retirement residence, daughters, Linda Vurma and Susan Baltjes, found three historical WahWashKesh documents. They are: a November 27, 1959 letter to Wah-Wah-Kesh cottagers from President, C. H. (Hap) Schauer and Secretary-Treasurer,

C. J. (Cec) Garnett; the June 20, 1960 Newsletter cited above; and minutes of the August 12, 1959, Annual Meeting.

President Tommy Tweed opened this meeting, then, due to illness, turned the meeting over to Mrs. Jean Tweed. Don Comrie Sr., the retiring Secretary-treasurer presented a statement from the Toronto Dominion Bank showing a July 31, 1959, balance of \$476.30. The newly-elected President was 'Hap" Schauer, V.P. was Mona Bennett and C. J. Garnett was the new Secretary-treasurer. Directors were Dr. Frank Griffin, Glenn Mundy, Rev. Calvin W. Robinson and Ross Gallanders.

Item 8 indicates the membership fees were \$10 for a voting member and \$5 for an associate. Item 9 reports, "Wah-Wash-Kesh now hosts 87 summer cottage owners". Item 12 lists social activities planned by the Association: two square dances, Junior Association activities and a Beach Party to include swimming contest, canoe racing, hot-dog-eating contest.

The first item in the June 20, 1960 newsletter reports that the ice went out about May 7 and the water level was the highest in 14 years. Claude Bosley of Linger Long reported that it was 14' above the average summer level.

Another item of interest is, "The reduction in the discount on U.S.

Funds. . . will encourage American Tourists . . . to our area. Cliff Bennett will operate his store. . . supplying groceries, meats and fresh vegetables. Cliff also added that a full time laundress has been engaged. The radio telephone will be in operation and the number is "WahWashKesh 800, via Parry Sound."

These three documents will be placed for safekeeping in the Association Archives.

#### **Magnetawan River** Watershed Association

This year the MRWA plans to set up water quality monitoring along the length of the watershed involving lakes such as Ahmic, Cecebe, Whitestone, Gooseneck, and WahWashKesh. Various lake and cottage associations have all purchased Yellow Springs Instrument Professional Plus water testers and our Association plans to buy one this spring. This will enable trained personnel from various lakes to test their own lakes and lakes in their immediate area that do not have a tester. The results from all these tests will be collated by the MRWA and shared with the Ministry of Natural Resources and with the other members of the MRWA. This will alert members to any changes in the watershed and help with the identification of the source of the change. The Lake WahWashKesh Conservation Association is still looking for a representative to the MRWA. A knowledge of the watershed is not required and the MRWA normally holds one or two meetings a year in the summer months; the balance of the communication is by e-mail. 

# Lake Access and Parking

In 2012 the Parking & Lake Access Committee developed a new parking area near the Bennett's Bay access point and also completed a significant –life extending– repair to the Indian Narrows dock. A voluntary Parking Permit is now required for parking as well as a Lake Access Permit. The associated permit fees have been well advertised and will again be included in the spring 2013 newsletter. Parking fees will continue to be charged until monies invested into the new parking area are fully recovered.

All costs for the new parking lot were paid in the late fall of 2012. The special "package deals" on permits and memberships was well supported and generated enough funds to pay off the parking lot debt.

We have no plans for 2013 except for repairs of a mandatory nature on either the lake access points or the parking area. The bottom end of the parking lot will be gravelled in the future once funds are available.

Meanwhile thank-you for your continued support.

#### Notes from the Treasurer

As previously announced, our goal this year was to provide the financial report in this issue of the newsletter, in order to shorten the Annual Meeting. Unfortunately at the time of writing I was unable to complete the necessary information for the full financial report so as in the past it will have to be made available at the meeting.

I am able to provide some of the highlights for the year:

- The parking lot was constructed at a cost of \$26,686. This amount will be posted as an asset and amortized over 30 years. Parking revenue for 2012 was approximately \$10,000 so we are well on our way to paying this down.
- We are updating the calendar sales but looks like we sold approximately 192 to date. Our cost in total was \$3284 and we received \$15 per calendar, or \$2880. An additional \$5 per calendar, or approximately \$800 was donated towards the purchase of the water tester. For those of you doing the math, the total donation was slightly lower than 192 X \$5 as a number were sold at the meeting before the motion to raise the price to \$20 and donate \$5 was passed. We still have about 200 calendars left, and it was agreed by the Directors that these could be sold off at half price or \$10 each. These can be obtained from Don Comrie, myself or at Bennett's store.
- In general we had an increase in parking fees and membership due to the prepaids we encouraged to help raise the money quickly for the parking lot. While this resolved the short term cash flow issue it will of course mean lower revenues for the next few years. We did close the year with cash on hand of \$4090 and were able to pay all expenses.

Please feel free to email me if you have any questions and I look forward to presenting the complete report at the AGM.

## Volunteer Anglers Needed to Collect Fish Data

The Board of Directors of the Lake WahWashKesh Conservation Association is seeking anglers to help assess the sport fish on WahWashKesh Lake. In the past, infrequent angler surveys have been conducted, the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources has not checked our fish population in over ten

years, and monitoring fish spawning beds has not provided very useful information. For many, the sport fishing on WahWashKesh Lake is an important activity.

The data collection we are requesting is minimal and will take little time. We will provide you with a clipboard, data sheets, and a measuring board. The information to be filled out includes number of anglers, start and end time for fishing, the species

you are trying to catch, the, the length of fish all fish caught (even those released), and note if the fish was kept or released. All this information will be gathered on your boat. Fish species of interest include pickeral (or walleye), small-

mouth bass, largemouth bass, pike, lake trout, and rock bass. We ask each volunteer to provide data for at least 10 fishing trips, more if you like.

We hope this information will provide valuable data on the sport fish in WahWashKesh Lake, especially if this data can be

collected over a number of years. Data such as number caught per hour of fishing, size distribution of fish, and insights on reproductive success since the lake is not stocked with fish.

If you are interested in to participate as a volunteer angler, please contact Mike Maceina or Don Comrie. We will make arrangements to get you the data sheets, clipboards, and measuring boards.

# Fish Enhancement Committee Report

As many of you will remember, in 2012 the committee monitored both lake trout and pickerel spawning beds by actual observation of the beds. This required volun-



teers and paid workers to go out in boats at night, often in very adverse conditions such as snow storms and freezing water, to physically observe what fish were spawning and how many. This method of evaluation proved very unsuccessful and the Association has since been advised by our insurance provider that they would not cover any claims resulting from this monitoring due to the adverse conditions. As a result, the Committee has decided to recruit several volunteers who do a lot of fishing on the lake to keep creel records indicating size, species, whether the fish was kept or released, etc. The records can be kept in the boat until the end of the season and then turned in to either Mike Maceina or Don Comrie. If you are interested in volunteering to complete the creel records, please contact either Mike or Don at our e-mail addresses. Thanks for your help with this and we look forward to getting valuable information!



# Proposed Helipad Site Behind Bennett's

Since the report in the fall 2012 newsletter, the Executive have made some small progress on this issue. We have virtually exhausted all avenues that might have led to information concerning what was removed from the former dump site when it was decommissioned in 2000. After contacting the Ministry of the Environment (MOE), they advised that they would not tell me what tests were required in order for approval to be granted but that a geophysical engineering company would know what tests were required. I then contacted a geophysical engineering firm in Haileybury who were recommended to me. They are extremely busy and since I had to be honest with them and explain that we had no money this year but were looking for an approximate cost for the tests, they have yet to respond. They have said they would get us an estimate in the near future. Once we receive the estimate, it is our plan to apply for grants to cover this expense from organizations such as The Trillium Foundation. At the same time, I plan to take this issue to our local MPP Mr. Norm Miller, MPP for Parry Sound - Muskoka. I do want to do everything I can before I take this issue to Mr. Miller to indicate our commitment to this proposal and the need we have in this area for a helipad. I look forward to having more information in time for the AGM.

#### Shoreline Video Project

As some of you will remember, in 1993 when Wayne Lennox was president, he applied for and received a grant which was used to do a VHS video of the entire shoreline of Lake WahWashKesh. To this end, we are looking for two volunteers who can spend several days going slowly around the lake filming the shoreline. Experience in filming or videotaping might be helpful but is not essential. A camera that eliminates shaking or the movement of the boat would be an asset! Nominal expenses will be covered such as gas. If you are interested, please contact one of the **Executive. Thanks!**



This "Green Corner" features numerous useful items for the cottage including an impressive pocket radio, quality running/hiking shoes, awesome clothespins, tasty, eco-friendly coffee - and more!

#### **CC Pocket Radio**

(C. Crane Company)

The "CC Pocket" is a quality pocket radio that runs on two AA batteries and has excellent audio for such a small radio. You can use the radio with the "Voz-P" wooden earbuds that come with it and this provides about 75 hours of play before requiring new, or recharged, batteries. You can also play the radio using the built-in speaker and you will get about 25 hours of play. This pocket radio does work with rechargeable batteries. The radio gets both AM and FM and has a clock, an alarm, a sleep timer, numerous station presets as well as built-in AM and FM antennas and much more.



# **SoftSpeaker 2 Pillow Speaker** (C. Crane Company)

A nice accessory for your CC Pocket Radio (or other radio) is the "SoftSpeaker 2 Pillow Speaker". Now you can enjoy listening to your radio when you go to bed without disturbing others. This speaker doesn't have to go under your pillow, it can sit on it. The speaker is in soft foam with a cover that can be removed and washed. The pillow speaker plugs into the headphone jack of the radio and even has a volume control.

#### Eco-Friendly Coffee

(Muskoka Roastery Coffee Co.)

A cup of coffee by the lake is a pleas-



ant experience which can be made even better by using quality, ecofriendly coffee from a

local company. Located in Huntsville, the Muskoka Roastery Coffee Co. has numerous coffees which are "sourced from Rainforest Alliance Certified farms" (you can read more about this on their website) which has standards for sustainable agriculture as well as working conditions for farm workers. The company is also involved in other environmental initiatives including making jute bags into reusable shopping bags as well as reusing, recycling and composting other materials.

Recently I tried their "Black Bear" coffee as well as their "Loon Call Breakfast Blend." Black Bear is a dark, full-bodied coffee that is a blend of South and Central American beans while Loon Call Breakfast Blend is a medium-roast coffee. Both are very good.

#### Indestructible Nozzles

(Lee Valley)

What home, or cottage, can't use a couple of quality "Indestructible Nozzles"? The design of these nozzles is based on those created in the 1940s and used at gas stations. Flexing the rubber hose turns the nozzles on. One nozzle produces a jet stream which is



good for washing around the home or cottage while the other nozzle produces a spray which is good for watering gardens. The nozzles are made of rubber with brass fittings and are sold individually or as a pair.

#### Men's Barefoot Run Trail Glove (Merrell)

While I don't do much running, I'm enjoying my "Men's Barefoot Run Trail Glove" which is also used for hiking and biking. If you are looking for a well-cushioned shoe with thick soles, these aren't for you. But if you want a very lightweight (just over 6 ounces), flexible, comfortable shoe that gets good traction then you should check out these shoes.



The first thing that I noticed about these shoes is how light they are. Then I noticed their comfort and performance on the hiking trails. And being a vegan I appreciate wearing a quality shoe that

does not contain any animal products. While I haven't had these shoes for too long I'm looking forward to using them hiking.

#### **Lifetime Clothespins** (Lee Valley)



Hanging clothes outside is definitely the best way to dry them. Long-lasting and strong clothespins haven't been easy to find. For the last year I've been using Lee Valley's "Lifetime Clothespins" made of stainless steel. I've really tested the clothespins including using them for wet bath towels and dripping wet hockey equipment and in strong winds and they've worked great.

#### **Large Neon Flexi** Lead (Flexi)

Recently we got a "Large Neon Flexi Lead" for walking our Shepherd mix dog. This leash is for dogs up to 50 kilograms (110 pounds) and features a 5-metre (16 foot) retractable lead of neon-coloured tape along with a chromed snap hook and brake button. The leash is guite light and provides our dog with room to explore while providing us with some control which is important in areas with lots of wildlife.



# Book Reviews by N. Glenn Perrett


This selection of books is for various ages and includes a variety of nature books, a good novel and even a recipe book for making ice pops. Ideal for the cottage!


#### The Birds of Georgian Bay

Bob Whittam, Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre 2012, 240 pages ISBN: 9780988099401

The Birds of Georgian Bay looks at "...birds and their place in the natural history of Georgian Bay." And it is one of the nicest nature books that I've seen. Written by Bob Whittam, a biologist and former Executive Director of the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre, The Birds of Georgian Bay covers numerous interesting topics from birdwatching tips to migration to success stories involving such birds as Trumpeter Swans, Bald Eagles, Ospreys and Double-crested Cormorants. And for those who believe that cormorants have a significant effect on "sport fish", Whittam dispels this myth stating, "Studies by the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources in the mid '90s showed that sport and commercial fish species were not the main prey for cormorants, with only a small percentage of Yellow Perch and Smallmouth Bass being taken."

Complementing Whittam's informative and entertaining text are more than 240 colour photographs. The Birds of Georgian Bay is available from the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre http://www.wyemarsh.com/.





# **The Green Thoreau**edited by Carol Spenard LaRusso New World Library 2012 (revised edition), 105 pages ISBN: 9781608681433


A good book of quotations is *The Green Thoreau*. Edited and introduced by Carol Spenard LaRusso, this revised edition (first published in 1992) features numerous quotations from Henry David Thoreau whose books included Walden. Quotations are taken from numerous sources including his books, letters and his journal.

Thoreau lived from 1817-1862 and his thoughts are just as relevant and important (some are more important) today. His famous quotation "In Wildness is the preservation of the World." was written more than a century and a half ago and is a vital message our species still hasn't learned.

#### If You Hold a Seed

Elly MacKay, Running Press Kids 2013, 32 pages, ISBN: 9780762447213, ages 2+

If You Hold a Seed by Elly MacKay is a delightful nature book for children of all ages about the wonderful things that can happen when a tree seed is planted. The story tells how a child plants a seed in



the soil. Over the seasons and years the sapling grows into a mature tree that provides seeds of its own.


Future generations will have to be better stewards of the planet than recent generations have been and this book is an important story of how a

simple act can have such a positive impact on the planet. It also educates children about the importance of wishes, dreams, patience and perseverance.

#### **Dragonflies**

Chris Earley, Firefly Books 2013, 32 pages, ISBN: 9781770851863, **ages 8**+

Educating children about the animals who we share the planet with is important and *Dragonflies* by Chris Earley is a very good book for young naturalists. Information such as what dragonflies are




and their life cycle combined with a "Mini Field Guide" and quality photographs provides a comprehensive look at these insects and how to i dentify

them. Earley has a similar book entitled Caterpillars (ISBN: 9781770851832).

#### **An Irish Country Wedding**

Patrick Taylor, Forge 2012, 428 page, ISBN: 9780765332172

What's better than a good novel at the cottage? A series of good novels! My favourite novels are those of the "Irish Country" series by Patrick Taylor. The setting of these stories is the Ulster village of Ballybucklebo where Doctors Fingal Flahertie O'Reilly and Barry Laverty care for the villagers.



The main storyline in the most recent book in the series, An Irish Country Wedding, is the wedding of Dr. O'Reilly and Kitty O'Hallorhan. But lots more is happening in this seventh book in the series including Colin Brown's ferret getting into trouble and Sonny Houston, an archaeologist, on the trail of an important discovery.

Patrick Taylor's stories of life in Ballybucklebo during the mid 1900s are entertaining and often hilarious. Once you read a book or two or you'll want to read the rest to find out what happens to the interesting characters in this quaint village. And as good as these novels are, they are even better on audio expertly read by John Keating.


# Peterson Field Guide Colouring Books: Birds

You can learn to identify many of the birds in North America, and have fun doing it, with this field guide colouring book. The Peterson Field Guide Coloring Books: Birds features 262 colour bird stickers that are used as reference to colour the corresponding black-and-white illustrations. As you colour the birds you will learn to identify the various species. Accompanying the drawings is information about the different birds including his/her colours. Alden also provides information on bird species, families, identifying birds and the parts of a bird.

When you have completed the book you will have your own field guide to help you identify your feathered neighbours. This is an excellent book for young naturalists.

A similar book exists for reptiles and amphibians - Peterson Field Guide Coloring Books: Reptiles and Amphibians (ISBN: 9780544026957).




# Nature's Notes: Bite-Sized Learning & Projects for All Ages

ing text and some projects. There are chapters on flowers, bugs and birds and the chapter "Take Your Best Shot" has advice on taking photos. There are also lined




pages at the back of the book for taking notes and blank pages for sketches.
