President's Message

Greetings from your Association Executive.

I am writing this at WahWashKesh where it is supposed to go to -3°C (25°F) tonight with showers (the showers might end up as the white stuff). Daytime highs are around +4°C (38°F) and all the leaves are off the trees.

Since the AGM, your Executive have been working on several issues and we'd now like to bring you up to date on them.

The Geographic Names Board, part of the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, met on September 19, 2011 and reviewed our application to rename Pine Ridge Point to Hayward Point in honour of the Hayward Family. They had three options to deal with our file; approve it, deny it, or

defer it. They chose to defer our application, in spite of the tremendous support for the renaming, because we failed to show "current local usage" of the name. As a result, a letter has been mailed to all members with an enclosed form requesting an indication of how many years each member has called Pine Ridge Point Haywards'. I ask that you fully complete the form and return it to me at the address indicated. I would like to have sufficient responses by the end of the calendar year to forward to the Board. They have indicated that they then will send out a survey to the responders and then resubmit our application to the Board when it next meets likely in the spring. I have already received over 150 responses indicating lengthy current local usage. Please send in your form as soon as possible. Thank you for your support of this worthwhile project.

As indicated at the AGM, verbal approval for the helipad to be

located on the site of the old dump at Bennett's had been obtained from the OMNR and the MOE. At the end of October, I was advised that Canadian Helicopters, the operators who provide for ORNGE the air ambulance service, have done a site inspection service on the dump site and report that a lot of trees around the perimeter would have to be removed. Your Executive will continue to work on this project over the winter and hope to have the site operational by next summer. I would like to express my thanks to Bob Whitman, Fire Chief for the Municipality of Whitestone, for his support and efforts to obtain these approvals.

At this year's AGM, Pat Forbes stepped

down from her position as director. Enclosed is Pat's picture after being thanked for her service. GOOD NEWS! - New Parking for Bennett's Bay



New Parking

On October 27th we received word that the new proposed parking area had completed its approval journey/process through the MNR, etc.

Dean Timson (Land & Waters Technical Specialist) of the MNR will now take steps so that we can get both a clearing permit and a work permit. It is safe to say that the new parking lot site has been approved and we will start work once we have the needed permits. Included in this newsletter is a good "birds eye view" of the new parking lot site.

We are anxious to get site preparations underway but at this point we do not know when clearing can start. We are still hoping for this fall and winter!

Handicap Parking

We are working with the Municipality to get a number of handicap parking spots at Bennett's Bay and Indian Narrows. Parking locations would be as close to the lake access locations as possible. A by-law would need to be passed so that the signs can be placed and then monitored so that only vehicles with visible handicap permits park in the designated locations. These signs should be in place for the busy parking season in 2012.

Land Use Permit and Memorandum of Agreement

This agreement between your Association and the Municipality of Whitestone will be modified in 2012 to include all parking areas as well as the lake access areas at both Bennett's Bay and Indian Narrows. This change flows from the new parking area being added and from the fact that the current agreement is due for renewal in 2013.

The MNR is behind this agreement and its preparation. They have downloaded their responsibility to the Municipality by agreement. The Association in turn has a stewardship agreement for *Lake Access & Parking Areas* with the Municipality of Whitestone. All this is purely administrative information and will take place over the months ahead. It is understood that the new parking area will fall under the Municipality's current insurance coverage.

Lake Access and Parking Fees

For the year 2012 there will be new permits provided and sold by the Lake WWK Conservation Association.

All permits will be sold through the current processes and at current locations.

We wish to keep administration of these permits as simple as possible and are relying on our common interests and cooperative spirit to make this initiative a success!

LAKE ACCESS BOAT PERMIT

The "Lake Access Permit" will replace the dock permit and will cost \$30. These funds are used to maintain the dock area and docks at both Bennett's Bay and Indian Narrows. We plan to replace the Indian Narrows docks in the future. The Lake Access Permit allows access to the lake whether using docks or launching a boat. This permit does not allow long term boat parking at either dock. We all have experienced frustration at times with long term dock "parkers"—although I noted this year there was more effort to minimize parking at the public docks. We are stewards of the lake access area by way of our agreement with the MNR and Municipality.

CAR PARKING PERMIT

This is a new permit effective 2012 and will cost \$25. These new funds will be used to maintain the current parking areas and build the new parking lot. The parking permit allows one vehicle to park on the current road allowance parking area or in the new parking area once it is available. This parking permit can either be mounted on your bumper or placed on your dash in a visible location. We are hoping for "good will"

on this initiative from all those who use the parking facilities.

For those who have a variety of family/members using parking facilities it is envisaged that several parking permits would be purchased and then be moved around among vehicles as needed.

If both a Lake Access and a Parking Permit are purchased by one person/family the combined cost will be \$50.

Dock permits	47	56	75



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


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Corn Roast

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Water Quality Trends in the Magnetawan River Watershed

Volunteers from the Magnetawan River watershed including WahWashKesh Lake have taken water quality samples in cooperation with the Ontario Ministry of the Environment Lake Partner Program. This data includes total phosphorus which is the limiting nutrient to algae on Canadian shield lakes and water transparency. Increases in phosphorus will increase tiny microscopic algae (phytoplankton) in the water column, cause the water to turn greenish, and reduce the clarity or visibility in the water. A secchi disk is used to measure water transparency and will change with the amount of phytoplankton algae in the water.

Upstream from WahWashKesh Lake, along the Magnetawan River, water quality data has been collected every year from Ahmic and Cecebe Lake since 2001-2002. On the Magnetawan River between Ahmic and WahWashKesh Lakes and downstream in the river below WahWashKesh Lake, phosphorus data has been collected, but over irregular intervals in the upper and lower sections of the Magnetawan River.

Below is a figure that presents average total phosphorus concentrations (measured in parts per billion, ppb) from Cecebe Lake going downstream through the Magnetawan River watershed that were collected from 2002 to 2010.



As you can see, phosphorus concentrations in WahWashKesh Lake at 8 ppb were slightly lower than at other sites in the Magnetawan River watershed.

A more comprehensive data base exists from Ahmic and Cecebe Lake that also includes water transparency that can be compared each year to water quality in WahWashKesh Lake. The figures in the right column plot average annual total phosphorus concentrations and water transparency from each lake from 2001-2002 to 2010.



From the graphs above, phosphorus concentrations were lower or the same in WahWashKesh Lake compared to Ahmic and Cecebe Lakes. Total phosphorus averaged 8 ppb in WahWashKesh Lake compared to 10 and 12 ppb in Ahmic and Cecebe lakes. Over time, phosphorus concentrations have declined in Cecebe Lake, but have remained relatively constant in Ahmic and WahWashKesh Lake. Water transparency (measured in meters) was either higher or the same in WahWashKesh Lake compared to the two upstream lakes. Water transparency averaged 3.3 meters in WahWashKesh Lake compared to 2.8 and 3.0 meters in Cecebe and Ahmic lakes.

Thus, from these data, water quality in WWK Lake is about the same or possibly slightly better compared to other water bodies in the Magnetawan River system. Further information would be needed to determine why water quality in Ahmic and Cecebe lakes is slightly less than in WahWashKesh Lake, but greater development, inputs from water treatment facilities, or other watershed characteristics are possible causes. Continued monitoring of water quality is important to detect if any changes do occur. Leaching of nutrients from faulty or non-existent septic systems and upstream inputs of nutrients is an issue that should be closely watch in WahWashKesh Lake.



The following are some eco-items I've been impressed with.

Old-Fashioned Table Hockey

Each summer when our children go to their grand-parents' cottage they enjoy playing an old Munro table hockey game. Recently we got a table hockey game hardware kit from Lee Valley (item 50k40.01) that is patterned after the Munro hockey game produced in Canada during the 1930s to the 1950s. Lynn and our children will build the game which will become a fun family activity when they are done. The kit includes instructions, the hardware components and a full-scale template. You supply the wood and paint – although you can also purchase a piece of hardwood (item 50k40.03) for the playing surface from Lee Valley. Lee Valley's Table Hockey Hardware Kit is old-time hockey at its best!

CCRadio-2

(C. Crane Company www.ccrane.com)

We live in an area where radio reception is usually

poor. Fortunately, the CCRadio-2 gets good reception. The frequency coverage is for AM, FM, Ham and Weather Bands and the power source is an AC Power Cord or four NiMH Alkaline batteries. Some of the features of this quality radio that I like include: lighted display, clock, alarm, sleep timer, snooze feature and weather alert.

I'm currently trying out the CC Solar Observer and will review this eco-friendly radio in the spring issue.

Long-Handled Pruning Saw



If you want to make a custom handle for a saw you can purchase the saw blade (item 09A03.56) separately.

calendar. Each day contains an ornament that can be hung from the tree. Each colourful ornament is actually a miniature story book and the 24 story books






Each page contains a week with


the lined days broken up into "a.m." and "p.m." Throughout the calendar are photos of national parks and other scenic natural areas.





Fish Enhancement Committee

First of all we would like to thank those Association members who donated specifically to this committee and to those who supported us at the AGM by purchasing the alcohol for sale after the meeting. \$250.00 was raised in this way and helps us when we need to make up shortfalls between actual costs and the government grants we apply for to complete our projects.

We are working on two major projects this winter and next spring. The first will occur shortly when the lake temperature falls to 10°C and the lake trout begin spawning. Ken Webb has kindly agreed to monitor the one trout spawning bed that has been rehabilitated during the spawning season and actual fish counts will be taken by observation from shore. Unfortunately, this has to occur in the middle of the night so there is some inconvenience and risk. Thanks very much, Ken Webb.

The second project is to monitor the pickerel spawning beds in the spring. This project is much more costly and labour intensive since there are four spawning beds mostly accessible only by boat. The monitoring again must occur twice nightly and two or three times per week once the ice has gone out and the water reaches approximately 5°C.

The good news is that the OMNR has accepted our CFWIP (Community Fish & Wildlife Improvement Project) applications for purchasing safety equipment for the people doing the monitoring; the equipment will remain the property of the Fish Enhancement Committee. A second application will also be submitted to cover the costs associated with the spring monitoring except for the personnel costs. These will have to be borne by the Association but can be paid out of the Committee funds.

The Committee is looking for groups of two individuals who are interested in checking the spawning beds in the spring. A small amount of remuneration will be paid to those involved and costs will be reimbursed. Anyone who is interested should contact a member of the committee.

Thank you for your continued support of the Fish Enhancement Committee.

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Deadman's Island

"Deadman's Island got its name from the grave of a Mr. Jack McCloud." wrote John Swift in *Lake WahWashKesh the Early Years*. This past summer, my grandchildren and their father went exploring, searching on Deadman's for this grave. They found it, but in a neglected state.

I proposed that the Association under-

take a project to tend and mark this part of Lake WahWashKesh history in a more permanent fashion. The information we have is that Mr. McCloud was a "river driver" killed in an accident near Burnt Chutes around 1900. This was in the days of logging and floating the harvested logs down the "Mag". As I understand it, a river driver was one who worked with dynamite to blow apart log jams.

Mr. McCloud was buried on the island now known as Deadman's.

A 1973 letter written by Molly Swift, great aunt of Debra Swift Hummel, contains this paragraph:

I always liked Deadman's because the view from it was so sightly. Uncle Herbert and I used to land right on the rocky point not far from the grave of the Dead Man. At the time there was a

"Canada mourns one of her favourite sons."

There is a discrepancy about the inscription, since John Swift wrote that it was: "Canada mourns one of her sons."

This is also the inscription remembered by Ken Hayward.

I have talked with Debra Swift Hummel, current owner of Deadman's, and her response was, "I would certainly be supportive and appreciative of the Association's effort to place a memorial plaque at the site."

During an October 18, 2011, directors' meeting, the idea was given approval in principle so that contacts can be made and research begun. Debbie reports that her father wrote that the original cross was washed away in the high water of the 1930's. From Kenny Hayward she learned that as a child he remembers the original cross with boots hanging from it. Ken also said to Debbie that he recalls another grave with a cross and boots hanging from it further down river, on a bluff near Deep Bay. Lake residents are invited to share related history.

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
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
