Wow! There are many uses for this cool-looking flashlight that can be used "hands-free". The LED flashlight has a high, low and flash mode and uses two 3V lithium button-cell batteries. Since the flashlight features "four flexible steel wire legs" it can be hung from an item or wrapped around an object such as a tent pole. Comes with a removable carabiner that allows you to hang the flashlight from a backpack or keychain. The flashlight is available in three colours: green (item 68K06.78), blue (68K06.76) and red (68K06.77). Replacement batteries are also available (68K06.90).

Looking for durable, inexpensive wallets not made of leather? These traveller's wallets are sewn from tree leather – paper products made of "industrial-grade, FSC-certified kraft paper". According to the Lee Valley website the paper "is made from pulp that is processed in a way that leaves the long fibers unbroken, taking advantage of their natural strength and resilience."

Recently I was given a "Tree Leather Tote Bag" and I was impressed with its durability so I decided to try the wallets made of paper. As a vegan I am pleased to see products not made of the skin of animals and these tree leather wallets are very good.

The Tree Leather Card Wallet (item 09A09.37) measures 4.25" by 3.25" and features a removable 10leaf transparent insert that holds up to 20 cards. The wallet closes with a

Book Reviews

Curing Tuberculosis in Muskoka: Canada's First Sanatoria

Andrea Baston, photography and photographic editing by Candis Jones Old Stone Books Ltd. 2013, 240 pages, ISBN: 9780992090319

Muskoka is a scenic place enjoyed by permanent residents, cottagers and vacationers. It also has an interesting history including the important role that it played in fighting tuberculosis. This story is beautifully captured by Andrea Baston's well-researched book Curing Tuberculosis in Muskoka: Canada's First Sanatoria.

Gravenhurst was the site of Canada's first tuberculosis sanatorium - the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium. Built in 1897, this was Canada's first tuberculosis sanatorium and the third one in North America. After the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium was created, other sanatoria located in Gravenhurst followed. These facilities included the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives (1902), the first to operate free of charge to the poor, as well as the Minnewaska Sanatorium (1909), the Calydor Sanatorium (1916) and the ones so I enjoyed reading Conrad Muskoka Hospital (1923)

An entertaining, funny novel for teenagers (and adults) is Short for





Chameleon by Vicki Grant. The story sees two teenagers - Cam and Raylene - who help an elderly lady, Albertina, try to deal with a tragic crime that harmed her family years ago. In order to get revenge for Albertina, the two

teenagers have to go up against a nasty criminal. Cam's and Raylene's families have also had some sad experiences and the two teenagers slowly warm up to each other as they help Albertina.

Prior to meeting Albertina and Raylene, Cam's life centered mostly on helping his father who runs the "Almost Family Surrogate Agency" where Cam and his dad are "rent-a-relatives" where they hire themselves out as family members or friends to others who require someone to accompany them to a function. It's definitely a weird job but Cam and his dad are very good at it.

Besides the funny and interesting storyline of helping Albertina, Short for Chameleon is a nice novel about friends, family, life and helping others. The entertaining novel includes positive messages. Highly recommended!

Birds Make Nests is a good nature book for kids of all ages that shows the different types of nests used by various birds. Close to 30 species of birds are featured – along with many of their nests. The book starts off with a mute swan and her babies and ends with a common loon with two babies on her back. In between these birds you will see such birds as painted buntings, osprey, ruby-throated hummingbirds, great horned owl, Atlantic puffins, Bal-

timore oriole, great crested flycatchers, wood ducks - and many others!

Michael Garland's beautiful woodcut illustrations will hold a reader's attention as he/she learns about the types of nests used by a variety of birds.

Looking for an educational nature book for young children? Over and Under the Pond is an interesting look at the plants and animals who live in an around a pond and how they are all connected. Young readers will marvel at the animals found above the pond and will learn about who lives below the pond. Some of the animals featured in the book include crayfish, turtles, beetles, fish, blackbirds, moose, beaver, tadpoles, minnows, dragonflies, raccoons and lots more.

At the end of the story there is information about the pond ecosystem as well as additional information about the animals in the book.

Excellent book for children interested in nature – and even better for those who haven't yet learned how awesome the natural world is! Highly recommended.

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
