
MUNICIPALITY OF WHITESTONE

FINANCIALS

The Lake Wah-Wash-Kesh Conservation Association 2021 financial year is rapidly coming to a close. We did very well on revenues this year, in spite of it being a second COVID year. Memberships paid this year are just under 160 members, an increase from our average of 120. All of our permit revenues are up this year, which will help pay for our new water testing regime. We also received two donations for water testing, \$100 from Morton's Point Camp and \$1,000 from Graham Keene. Thank you to both!

Expenses are expected to be on par with last year or slightly less. Overall, a healthy year end surplus is expected.

Also, at the September 14th AGM, the membership approved increases to our membership/permit fees in order to provide additional funding for the costs of water testing.

The increases are as follows:

Membership - Increased to \$50 annually Combination Car Parking/Lake Access -

Increased to \$75 annually

Car Parking - Increased to \$40 annually Lake Access - Increased to \$45 annually

Trailer Parking - Increased to \$35 annually

Stay safe and enjoy the fall season. I'm looking forward to winter snowshoeing soon!

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Green Corner

Even if you keep your cottage in as wild a state as possible (which is preferable), there are still lots of jobs to do and the *DeWalt 60V MAX Brushless Attachment Capable String Trimmer* can help. Recently we put this tool to good use and it has performed very well! The string trimmer features an adjustable cut swath (15"/17"), a quick-load spool, variable trigger and hi/low speed control.

A particularly nice feature of this battery-powered tool is that the Attachment Capable Powerhead that comes with the string trimmer accepts additional tool pieces (sold separately) including an edger (DWOAS4ED), a bush cutter (DWOAS5BC), a pole saw (DWOAS6PS), a hedge trimmer (DWOAS8HT) and a blower (DWOAS7BL). And the battery-operated tools means you aren't dependent on annoying electrical cords or fossil fuels!

While our pressure washer isn't one of our more frequently used tools, when we need it it really helps out with our projects. In the past we have used pressure washers for several tasks including cleaning decks. Most recently we used our *Craftsman 2100 PSI Electric Cold Water Pressure Washer* (CMEPW2100) on our century barn, which we are restoring, and on the board and batten



wood exterior on our house that we are staining.

The pressure washer performed well with both projects. With the barn's stone foundation the washer effectively removed dirt, loose cement and other matter so that we could efficiently restore the old foundation by adding cement where it was needed.

The pressure washer also cleaned the surface of the wood boards on our house in preparation of applying stain. Removing debris on the wood exterior allowed for the stain to adhere effectively ensuring a longer-lasting job and minimizing the amount of stain required to do a good job.

This Craftsman pressure washer is easy to assemble and use and it has many good features including: a 25' high pressure hose; rail locked wand storage; 10" wheels; multiple quick-connect wand tips for a variety of cleaning applications; a 13 amp motor; a soap tank; spray tip cleaning tool. Ensure that you read the instruction manual that comes with the washer and follow the safety and assembly instructions.

out of North Bay, Ontario, are an easy method for homeowners on a private septic to test for leaks in their waste system components. It's as simple as flushing it down a toilet in an active septic system, waiting for at least 24 hours and investigating for the fluorescent green/yellow colour. Instructions are included with each capsule, and a blacklight can be lent out to aid in detecting leaks.

As they age, private septic system components including the septic tank can sustain damage that isn't immediately obvious, but can still cause issues such as sewage backups or even drinking water supply contamination. A septic system failure causes untreated sewage to be released from the enclosed plumbing system causing unhealthy conditions. Raw sewage can rise to the surface from the underground pipes, connections, and septic tank and leach into the drain field. The sewage could also find its way into groundwater, surface water or marine water environments without visual detection.

The sewage carries pathogens and other dangerous contaminants. Exposure to raw sewage pathogens can make people and animals ill. Sewage leakage can also contami-

nate water sources and make them unsafe for drinking, swimming, bathing, and home usage. A septic dye test makes it easy to spot major problems without using more invasive inspections. Its most often used to check for leakage of septic effluent (liquid sewage) due to such things s broken pipes or incorrect installations. The dye makes any escaping effluent visible and traceable. If there is a problem with the system, the dye may show up in a drain field, your yard or a nearby waterway.

As popular as the septic dye test method is, it does have its limitations. Dye test failures are rare for properly maintained systems and when this test indicates a failure it is usually already showing other signs of leaks or clogs, such as backed up toilets and drains, sewage odours and sometimes even standing water around the tank or field. Recent rain or snow, a thick layer of leaves and tall grass may obscure any dye fluorescence on the soil surface that you may not always notice it. Even if no dyed effluents appear, that does not conclusively prove that your septic is working optimally.

This test cannot be used on either a brand newly installed system nor a recently pumped out system. This test relies on an operating septic. So by itself, this test with-

out further investigations at the septic tank, distribution box and even the drainfields, is not indicative of the complete condition of the system.

On the other hand, experienced inspectors have found so many failed septic systems with this simple test procedure that it is well worth performing and it offers an inexpensive way to detect many expensive problems.

Book Reviews


Call Me Indian: From the Trauma of Residential School to Becoming the NHL's First Treaty Indigenous Player

Fred Sasakamoose with Meg Masters, Foreword by Bryan Trottier, Viking, 2021, 268 pages ISBN: 9780735240018

Call Me Indian: From the Trauma of Residential School to Becoming the NHL's First Treaty Indigenous Player is the heart-wrenching and heartwarming life of Fred Sasakamoose. Born in 1933 on what is now called Ahtahkakoop Cree Nation in Saskatchewan, Sasakamoose was a residential school survivor having endured the horrors of a residential school for a decade. While Sasakamoose is remembered by many for his impressive hockey career which included being the first full Treaty Indigenous player to make the NHL playing for the Chicago Black Hawks in 1953-54, his story is so much more than that. He was married to his wife Loretta for 66 years and they had 10 children, 51 grandchildren, 88 great-grandchildren and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

And while his life was full of ups and downs, triumphs and tragedies, Sasakamoose improved the lives of Indigenous peoples by promoting sports and culture while warning of the damage caused by drug addiction and substance abuse. He also spoke of the importance of health and leading an active lifestyle and pursuing your dreams.


Sasakamoose was acknowledged for his hockey skills and tireless work for his community receiving numerous awards including being inducted into the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame (Builder category), be-



ing inducted into the Saskatchewan Hockey Hall of Fame (Player category), receiving an honorary doctorate of laws from the University of Saskatchewan and receiving the Order of Canada. In 1998 Sasakamoose was included in the NHL's diversity task force. He was also inducted into the Canadian Native Hockey Hall of Fame and he received a National Aboriginal Achievement Award.

Sasakamoose's extensive list of achievements is impressive, but one of his most beneficial and lasting accomplishments was telling his story in this book and informing and educating others of the difficulties and tragedies he had to endure. One such tragedy was when he and his brother Frank were abducted as young children from their family (a time he refers to as the "last day of my childhood") and taken to a Catholic residential school where they suffered unimaginable and horrific abuse - including physical abuse. Reading about life at the residential school was both disturbing and heartbreaking but it is an important story and Sasakamoose provides a glimpse into what many children had to experience in the schools.

"My parents didn't hit us. I had never seen any adult beat a child. But at St. Michael's, grown men and women were always beating kids....If a priest or nun or one of the brothers who was training to be a priest saw you someplace they didn't think you should be, or




maybe thought you were walking too slowly, or doing a sloppy job at something, they would take a swipe at you or kick you or bang your head into the wall or on the floor."


In telling his story, Sasakamoose educates us about the incredible atrocities and difficulties Indigenous peoples have suffered and still experience today.

"I will never forget how difficult it has been for my people. Our freedom was stolen. Whole generations were crippled by the restrictions of the Indian Act and by childhoods destroyed in residential schools. Even since those institutions disappeared, anti-Indigenous racism remains strong."

Call Me Indian is a very good autobiography. At the end of his book Sasakamoose says that he hopes, "by sharing my story now, non-Indigenous readers might have a better understanding of the hurdles we have to overcome to succeed."

Fred Sasakamoose's wish to enlighten readers is achieved in *Call Me Indian*. Highly recommended!





The Book of Tiny Creatures

Kids of all ages will enjoy learning more about tiny creatures in this informative, beautifully illustrated picture book. Divided into sections on "Who Are the Tiny Creatures?", "Life in the Sky", "Close to the Ground", "In the Water" and "Incredible Creatures", the text covers a variety of topics including mollusks, annelids, arthropods, reproduction, growing, flying, feeding, escaping, hunting, pollinating, walking, swimming, breathing – and much more.

Complementing the considerable information are sections such as where creatures go in winter, how honeybees live, setting up a shelter in the garden, a tour of an anthill and the life cycle of the giant diving beetle. Readers will also learn fascinating creature facts in the section on "World records" including a 140-year-old lobster, an insect species that is 50 centimetres long, a dragonfly species that

flies 70 km/h and a worm species in the North Sea that grows to 30 metres long! And the illustrations are stunning!

The Book of Tiny Creatures is a picture book children will frequently revisit to learn more about the incredible world of tiny creatures.

State of Terror

State of Terror is a rivetting political thriller by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Louise Penny. The United States has a new administration and it is obvious that there is friction between the President and his Scretary of State, Ellen Adams. For decades Adams has run an international media empire and during the recent campaign she had supported the President's competitor for the party nomination. So why had the President chosen Ellen Adams as his Scretary of State? One reason was that he now controlled one of his toughest critics. But they are going to have to get along - and quickly - after bombs go off on buses in central London, Paris and then Frankfurt,

Germany. And while these are tragic events, it is soon realized that they are only the beginning of a much larger plan than can wipe out entire cities and areas in the United States. Time is ticking down to potentially catastrophic events resulting in the Secretary of State flying to numerous countries and meeting with various people including politicians and heads of state to solve what exactly is planned, who is involved, where it will occur and how the deadly acts can be averted.

Clinton and Penny have created a captivating and interesting political thriller that includes humourous references to the previous administration along with some of Penny's characters from her own novels.

Outside, You Notice




Outside, You Notice is an informative picture book that encourages children to get outdoors and observe things. These observations are complemented with information about a variety of things including animals, trees, flowers, seeds, pollination, water and soil (i.e. "Soil is a mixture of tiny pieces of rock and tiny pieces of decomposed plants.")


Some of the many health benefits of being outdoors and being in nature is also included such as feeling less anxiety and improving your immune system. Some of the places shown in the book are: back yard, park, garden, sidewalk, hiking trail and playground.

Outside, You Notice is a nicely illustrated picture book that will have kids looking forward to spending time outside.

Lyme Disease, Ticks and You: A Guide to Navigating Tick Bites, Lyme Disease and Other Tick-Borne Infections

Ticks and the diseases they transmit, including Lyme disease, are becoming more common in North America including Southern Ontario. Three of the four humans in our family have had at least one tick as have both of our canine family members. Unfortunately, the health care system isn't nearly as effective as it should be when it comes to dealing with ticks making information on this topic vital. The author, Shelley Ball, had difficulties getting diagnosed for Lyme disease and this book is a comprehensive guide about what Lyme disease is as well as advice on diagnosis, treatment and prevention as well as recognizing Lyme and other tick-borne diseases.

My experiences with tick bites and the health care system have been frustrating but they pale in comparison to what Shelley Ball has experienced. Ball has suffered significantly from a tick bite and she has been disappointed with her experiences with health care providers as she points out in the Introduction to her book.

"When I found an engorged tick on my back in 2019, little did I know this discovery would lead to months of debilitating symptoms, dismissive arguments with many doctors, hours of research on Lyme and other tick-borne diseases (OTBDs) and effectively being abandoned by my public health care system."

Ball's book Lyme Disease, Ticks and You is her attempts to help others by informing them about Lyme disease and ticks and how they can "become strong self-advocates who can fight for the health care they need."

In her important and much-needed guide, Ball covers the following topics (and more): what is Lyme disease, the biology of Lyme disease, how ticks feed and spread disease, tick habitat, reducing tick bites, checking for ticks, removing ticks, symptoms of Lyme disease, diagnosing Lyme disease and treating Lyme disease.

With ticks and the diseases they bring becoming increasingly common, Lyme Disease, Ticks and You is an important read.

Firekeeper's Daughter

Angeline Boulley's debut novel is an entertaining and suspenseful story featuring indigenous culture and historical injustices. It also includes the drug epidemic occurring in much of the world as well as the hockey culture in North America. The result is an outstanding novel that really is hard to put down.

Eighteen-year-old Daunis Fontaine has never fit in either in her hometown or the nearby Ojibwe reservation. While she was scheduled to go to the University of Michigan in the fall, Daunis changes her plans in order to look after her mother after a family tragedy.

When a lethal new drug that is possibly connected to Ojibwe culture shows up in hockey towns and on reservations, Daunis is recruited for an FBI investigation that also involves the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The investigation is interested in Daunis' help due to her knowledge of chemistry and Ojibwe traditional medicine. Not only does the investigation expose secrets of people close to Daunis, but it seems more interested in punishing the offenders than in protecting the community. As

Daunis struggles with the investigation and her part in it, people close to her suffer from the crimes and other consequences associated with drugs.

Firekeeper's Daughter is a superb novel about the scourge of drugs in society set in the fascinating Ojibwe culture and community. Not only was this book included in Reese Witherspoon's Book Club, but it is scheduled to be adopted for television with President Barack Obama and Michelle Obama's production company!

No More Plastic

No More Plastic is an excellent environmental picture book aimed at children 4 – 7 but is an important read for everyone. Isley loves the ocean but she is devastated when she finds a dead, beached right whale. The magnificent animal died due to plastic filling her stomach. Isley decides to try and stop people from using plastic. She makes signs, speaks to her family and writes politicians and everyone agrees that there is too much plastic. But they all forget about the tragedy with the whale so Isley gathers up all the plastic on the beach for months and makes "a sculpture as big as a whale." People stop, think and help – from the grocery store banning plastic bags to the school implementing "zero-waste lunch programs" to the town providing filling stations for water bottles. All working toward "the dream of a plastic-free world."

No More Plastic is an important picture book which delivers a vital message that cannot be ignored any longer. Complementing the text are beautiful illustrations that Fullerton "made using repurposed plastic, sand, and moss."



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FALL WATER LEVELS


The water level this fall was unusual at least in my 21 years on the lake!

There are a number of factors as outlined by Mayor Comrie. Please contact MNRF with your concerns. We need to have the MNRF and other government bodies respond to our concerns to change the impact of upper watershed dumping into Lake WahWashKesh.

There are two methods of checking water levels and flood information on the home page of our website - Hobo Link and the MNRF.

A concerned member noted these measurements on October 16, 2021 Ahmic Lake was up 1.15' Lake Cecebe was up .33' Lake Wah-Wash-Kesh was up 3.5'

UPDATE FROM MAYOR COMRIE

The control dams in the Magnetawan River watershed are managed by the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. Feel free to express your concerns to the MNRF Parry Sound District Manager, Adam Wakefield adam.wakefield@ontario.ca

I have already advised him of the situation with the inaccessible docks at our public landings, but it wouldn't hurt for others to reinforce the message.

For some time now, we have been trying to get the MNRF to extend their Magnetawan watershed forecasting and management to include WahWashKesh and the lower Magnetawan river basin, and to distrib-

ute the inevitable water level fluctuations more equitably over the entire system. The problem is that there are no control mechanisms west of Ahmic Lake; so all their operations are focused on the dams upstream of us.

The levels are much more tightly controlled on the lakes above us like Bernard, Doe, Cecebe, and Ahmic. Because of the large catchment area that drains through WahWashKesh, and the narrow and shallow stretch of river above and below our fixed dam, it will likely never be possible to obtain similar low fluctuations in water level on WahWashKesh.

It is quite normal to see our level go up a couple of feet in late fall as they drain down some of the upper lakes to increase capacity in the system for the spring freshet; however, this year this occurred much earlier because of the ~100mm rainfall we experienced throughout the entire watershed. Given the circumstances, I think it is safe to say there is nothing the MNRF could have done that would have prevented our level from going up by at least 2-3 feet.

I'm sorry to say we don't see any quick and easy solutions to the problem of water level fluctuations on WahWashKesh, but we are continuing to look for ways to both minimize them and mitigate their impact on lake residents.
