LANDING AGREEMENT WITH THE MUNICIPALITY

The current agreement between Municipality of Whitestone & WWKCA has expired. The Municipality has recently renewed the crown land use permits from the MNRF. The future agreement will be revised.

On April 19, 2022 the Municipality passed a motion to be responsible for the parking at both WahWashKesh public landings.

- The Municipality will be responsible for maintenance, enforcement and collection of parking permit fees in the near future
- Once implemented, the new permit system will be electronic, with parking permits for varying lengths of time available on line 24/7

This year, 2022, will be a transition year as WWKCA has already begun selling parking permits. The enforcement will also be a joint venture in the short term transitioning to full Municipal responsibility. This will provide a better understanding of the number and type of parking permits required and capacity requirements.

The agreement between WWKCA & Municipality must also address whether the Municipality assumes responsibility for the maintenance of docks, boom, water testing, and hobo link. The transfer of responsibilities will result in a negotiation of financial responsibilities and sharing of permit income between the Municipality and WWKCA.




ED BENNETT SR. MUNICIPALITY OF WHITESTONE • 2022 SENIOR OF THE YEAR •

Ed Bennett Sr. was one of the founding fathers of the Cramadog Snowmobile Club when snowmobiling was first started as a sport, volunteering for over 15 years, putting out trail markers and grooming the trails. Ed stored the groomers and equipment at the WahWash-Kesh Lodge, making many necessary repairs. More than once there was a break down and he walked home in the dark.

Ed was a founding father of the Magnetawan River Watershed Association (MRWA), and played an active role in their meetings and their desire to maintain good water quality along the Magnetawan River.

Since its beginning in 1954, Ed has played an active role in the Lake WahWashKesh Conservation Association. He was president during some of the early years and hosted the AGM in his boat barn every year - a tra-



dition that continues to this day. The Association's HobolinkTM lake level monitoring system is installed and powered from Bennett's store.

As a member of the Association's Fish Enhancement Committee, he worked with the MNR to re-

habilitate spawning beds for pickerel and lake trout. Ed provided storage for the rubble purchased through a CF-WIP grant and provided a barge and Bobcat loader when it was time to spread the rubble.

Ed was also a member of the committee that expanded the parking lot at the top of Indian Narrows Road to provide much-needed relief from the parking congestion.

More recently Ed has been a civilian member of the management committee for the Parry Sound District French-Severn Forest. This committee reviews logging operations in a large section of the province and works to keep the right balance of clearing and re-forestation. Congratulations Ed!

SHORELINE PROTECTION & DEVELOPMENT

PUBLIC LANDS ACT PRESENTATION AT OUR AGM

S/Sgt Robert Gibson, Manager-Parry Sound Enforcement Unit will be presenting on Public Lands Act pertaining to permits around public lands and shorelines

The following is a section from the Public lands act which applies to when permits are needed and what shoreline alteration, etc can be done.

Unless acting under the authority of the terms and conditions of a work permit or instrument granted under the act authorizing the activity

No Person Shall:

- a) Construct a building (on Crown land)
- b) Construct a trail, water crossing or road (on Crown land)
- c) Dredge shore lands
- d) Fill shore lands
- e) Remove invasive/native aquatic vegetation by mechanical means or by hand from shore lands
- f) Construct or place a structure or a combination of structures that is in physical contact with more than 15 square metres of shore lands.
- O.Reg. 239/13, s. 2 (1); O. Reg. 160/17, s. 2 (1).

A Work Permit is NOT required for the following:

- Boatlifts/marine railways hand laid (no dredging)
- Docks: on posts, piles or stilts, floating, or cantilevered over the water (included those constructed in a PSW)
- Crib docks where the crib(s) (i.e., footprint on lake bottom) being applied for at the time occupy less than 15 sq m (161 sq ft), and clean rocks from dry land are used
- Removal of old docks and boathouses (crib base left untouched)
- Minor or routine repairs to existing structures
- Residential water intakes or heat loops
- Minor road maintenance

PROTECTING & RESTORING SHORELINES

One of the reasons why I love canoeing the shoreline of Lake Wahwashkesh is because the majority of the shoreline has been kept in its natural state – at least in the areas I have frequented. Leaving shorelines natural is both good for the environment and aesthetically pleasing.

Protecting Shoreline Buffers

Shoreline buffer zones are vegetation areas between a lake and developed land. These areas are where water meets land and includes shallow water along with 20 – or more – metres of shore land. This area contains an abundance of various species of plants and animals including fishes, mammals, aquatic insects,



amphibians, reptiles and birds. Shoreline buffers are not only vital habitat for animals, including providing travel corridors, but they are also crucial for a healthy lake offering the following functions:

- filtering runoff
- · controlling runoff
- · reducing erosion
- limiting sediment and harmful substances from entering water bodies
- moderating water temperature
- absorbing nutrients including nitrogen and phosphorous

Shoreline buffers are also important as they serve as transition areas between water and upland areas. Leaving the shoreline buffer in a natural state improves water quality, protects fish spawning grounds and discourages algae growth to name a few more benefits.

Don't Touch It!

If you are fortunate to have a shoreline beffer in its natural state don't touch it. Leave it alone. Shoreline buffers that have been altered can be returned to a more natural state. The easiest and best approach to returning a shorelne buffer to a natural state is to allow it to regenerate naturally. It is rewarding and interesting watching the various native grasses, wildflowers and other plants establish themselves first, with bushes, shrubs and trees following soon after. If you want to speed up the process a little you can transplant tree seedlings and plants from unwanted areas – such as those growing too close to the cottage or driveway or on the septic – to the shoreline buffer. This is more effectively accomplished when the small trees are in a dormant state in early spring or fall.

This column includes practical and eco-friendly items for the cottage including battery operated vacuums, a fan for the wood stove, a miter saw and stand for building projects and greener cleaners for you, the environment and your septic system!

Craftsman 20V Max 3 in 1 Cordless Vacuum

(CMCVS001D1)

This battery-powered stick vacuum is practical for the cottages allowing you to easily access areas many vacuums can't reach. Not only does it not need electrical outlets (except to charge the battery), but it is relatively light weighing approximately 3.4 kilograms (7.5 pounds).

This Craftsman cordless stick vacuum is easy to use and take most places and it's light weight takes some of the pain out of vacuuming. It effectively removed the hair from our constantly shedding husky and terrier mix dogs along with the dirt and dog hair that accumulates in our vehicle.

The suction with this vacuum is quite good - especially for a small stick vacuum. To help maintain good suction, make sure that you clean and replace the filter as instructed and follow all of the instructions and safety warnings in the manual. The lift away dust canister is easily emptied. According to Craftsman, the vacuum gets up to an hour of run time and the first time that we used it the vacuum effectively worked for more than 40 minutes (and it was turned off and on numerous times as we did the different rooms in the house, car etc) before the battery needed to be charged again.

DeWalt 2 Gallon Cordless/Corded Wet-Dry Hepa Vacuum

Another good vacuum for the cottage is the DeWalt 7.5 Litre (two gallons) Cordless/Corded Wet-Dry Hepa Vacuum (item DCV581H) – a versatile, battery-powered tool. We have used the vacuum for a variety of tasks and it has performed well.

I like the fact that the vacuum can be powered with a 20V Max battery (not included) or an AC outlet making it convenient for a variety of jobs in and around the house or cottage.

Some of the vacuum's features include: a 7.5-litre (2 gallon) tank capacity; cordless or corded and powered by either a 20V Max battery or AC outlet; HEPA filter (washable/reusable; 5' x 1.25" diameter hose; hose, cord, accessory storage; crevice tool and wide nozzle tool.

Being relatively light to carry, the vacuum was effective in cleaning the staircase as well as behind furniture. Since the vacuum isn't on castors for easy, constant moving and it doesn't have a long wand to comfortably stand and vacuum for lengthy periods it is designed for cleaning small areas such as vehicles and area rugs as opposed to larger spaces like entire floors and wall-to-wall carpeting.







If you have a workshop and like to keep it clean and minimize dust and other debris escaping into the air and landing everywhere you can

purchase, separately, a dust collector (item DWV9000) for the vacuum. This dust extraction adaptor can connect a power tool to the vacuum hose and is "designed to work with Dust System Compatible DeWalt power tools." We have effectively used this device to significantly reduce the amount of sawdust scattered by our DeWalt miter saw.

Make sure that you read and follow all safety and operational instructions from the instruction manual for this vacuum and dust collector tool.

Ecofan AirDeco I (Model 8203)

We have been enjoying the warmth provided by our wood stove this winter. It quickly warms the living room in our 1895 house before the heat travels to the other parts of our home. Helping to



distribute the heat is our Ecofan AirDeco I.

The heat-powered wood stove fan sits on top of the wood stove and quietly (you have to carefully listen to hear any noise – it is almost silent) distributes the warmer air in the preferred direction. We often have the fan facing a nearby doorway so that the warm air is directed through it where it rises up a staircase to help heat the upstairs part of our house. Don't expect the fan to strongly blow the air, but it gently circulates the warmer air using the difference in temperature between the ambient air and the stovetop.

The Ecofan not only makes our wood stove more effective, but it does so without using electricity or batteries! Hopefully this new fan lasts like our older model of Ecofan that still works beautifully after more than 15 years!

To help ensure that your Ecofan works safely and efficiently, make sure that you follow the operating instructions that come with the Ecofan.

DeWalt Miter Saw (DHS790) & Miter Saw Stand (DWX723)

Over the years my wife, Lynn, and I have saved considerable money working on our home including installing numerous wood floors. And while we have used a decent miter saw, recently we used *DeWalt's 12" 120V Max Double Bevel Sliding Compound Miter Saw* (DHS790) and their *Heavy-Duty Miter Saw Stand* (DWX723). Wow!

Designed for professional sawing applications, this relatively heavy miter saw features a 12" diameter saw blade which works very well. There is lots to like about this impressive miter saw including that it is run by both batteries and the corded power supply that comes with it. While we usually use the convenient power provided by the batteries, it is nice to know that there is a second power source if required. The saw also features a high fence allowing you to line up and cut bigger boards.

The saw also comes with a dust bag as well as a clamp that securely holds wood in place and base extensions to support longer pieces of wood. It also features an LED worklight that not only shows you where the saw cut is, but lights up the area where you are cutting. Make sure that you read the informative instruction and safety manual and follow the directions and recommendations.

We use this miter saw with *De-Walt's Heavy-Duty Miter Saw Stand* (DWX723) and the two work well together. The saw is easily attached to the stand and working at a preferred height is more comfortable and something we weren't used to until we got these tools.

While the DeWalt miter saw and saw stand are not inexpensive, they are a good investment for those who do build, renovate and do similar work.

Excellent Mystery Series Makes for Entertaining Summer Reading

Detective Inspector Tom Reynolds series





A good historical novel is entertaining, based on a true story and educates the reader and *Band of Sisters* by Lauren Willig is an exceptional historical novel. The inspirational story follows a group of young women from Smith College in America who travel to France as








the "Smith College Relief Unit" in 1917 to help French villagers whose homes and lives have been intentionally destroyed by the German army. The brave group of American college women enter a war zone just behind the front lines to carry out their desperately needed humanitarian work for French villagers – many of whom were children – during World War I. Not only did these women make a huge difference to many people during the war, but they returned after the war to oversee the rebuilding of the villages.

Reading about the incredible work done by the Smith College Relief Unit was fascinating and inspirational particularly since the events are mostly true. According to the author in her "Historical Note" at the end of the story, "If there's an incident in the book, it almost certainly happened, but I may have moved it or conflated events for simplicity's sake." She goes on to say, "...the events are real, but all the women in the novel are fictional. Some are more fictional than others." Willig also points out that some of the women in the book were "...inspired by the characters of the actual members of the Unit as they conveyed themselves to me from their personal letters." And




for her story the author did rely heavily on the "...chatty, snarky, fascinating letters written home by the members of the Smith College Relief Unit."

Written by Ann Hobbie and illustrated by Olga Baumert, this book covers the Monarch Butterflies' life cycle, anatomy, milkweed plants, life in a milkweed patch, migration, food, predators - and more. There is also information on how you can help Monarchs along with some "Fun Facts", a glossary as well as where you can go to learn more about these animals. Complementing the informative picture book are stunning illustrations.






Mr. McGinty's Monarchs

Mr. McGinty's Monarchs is an interesting, educational nature story for children. The beautifully illustrated picture book sees Mr. McGinty and his dog Sophie enjoy the monarch butterflies near their home. When they come to the spot where numerous milkweed plants provide shelter and food for the butterflies they notice that someone has cut down the milkweed leaving the caterpillars clinging to the chopped down plants.

Mr. McGinty acts quickly and takes the caterpillars home where he puts them into aquariums and gives them milkweed leaves to eat. Realizing that there are too many caterpillars for one person to care for, Mr. McGinty visits a local school, educates the children about the life cycle of a monarch butterfly and enlists the help of sev-



eral classes to feed and care for the caterpillars. Mr. McGinty looks after one aquarium himself and once the caterpillars grow, form chrysalises and hatch into butterflies he and Sophie join the students in a local playground where they release all of the monarchs they cared for.

At the end of the heartwarming story there are informative sections on "Monarchs and Milkweed" and "A Monarch's Migration" where readers can learn more about these fascinating animals including how they need milkweed plants to survive and how they migrate.

The Girl from the Attic

I liked everything about *The Girl from* the Attic by Marie Prins. The characters are interesting and the setting is exceptional – a house built in the shape of an octagon in Northumberland County near Lake Ontario. And if that isn't already interesting enough, the novel aimed at middle-grade readers is a time travel story set in the fascinating house a century apart!

The main character is Maddy Rose, an 11-year-old girl who has moved with her mother and step-father, Dan, from a bungalow in Scarborough to a large, octagonal house in the country. Accepting these changes isn't easy for Maddy who doesn't get along with Dan. And soon she will also have to adjust to life with a baby sister!

Maddy not only has to deal with leaving her home and friends behind and trying to get along with Dan, but she also has to help out around the house more as her pregnant mother is always exhausted. Things become even more difficult – and fascinat-

ing – for Maddy when a black cat leads her into her new home's attic which takes Maddy back from 2001 to 1904. And it is in 1904 in the same house where she meets Clare and his sick sister Eva. As long as Shadow – the black cat – is around, Maddy is able to travel from the present back to 1904 and back again although she is never sure how much time has elapsed.

When she is in her home in 1904 she spends time helping Clare which includes trying to help Eva who is suffering from tuberculosis. Maddy's already busy life becomes even more chaotic when she returns to the present to learn of the premature birth of her sister.

The Girl from the Attic is an entertaining book to keep middle-graders (and older readers) reading during the summer. Diagrams of the house complement the text.

This Is The Boat That Ben Built

Jen Lynn Bailey, illustrated by Maggie Zeng Pajama Press 2022, 40 pages ISBN: 9781772782424 ages 5+

This Is The Boat That Ben Built is a nature, cumulative story that explores a northern river ecosystem. After building his boat, Ben sets out on a river where he sees various animals including fishes, a beaver, a loon, a moose, a heron – and more. Young readers will enjoy the fun story and quality illustrations. At the end of the story there are sections on all of the animals in the story – fishes, beaver, loon, goose, black bear, moose, heron, owl. There is also information about a northern river ecosystem and definitions for the following: ecosystem, keystone species, ecologist, predators, opportunistic feeders; omnivores; herbivores; carnivorous.

Nice nature picture book for young readers!

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
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TWO BURSARIES • FOR POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION •

It was evident that private road issues are a main concern along with any detrimental environmental/heritage feature impacts.


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
